Sully Plantation, Father's Day 2008

A Father's Day tradition is the pilgrimage to Sully Plantaion , near the Smithsonian Udvar-Hazy Air and Space Museum. The George Washington Chapter of the Model A Ford club of America hosts this annual event at this historic Fairfax County Park. The grass fields surrounding the plantation mansion saw several hundred vintage vehicles on display and rovided a fine setting in which to show off the Flathead Fords. Club members assembled under the shade trees to enjoy the sunny and breezy day in between wandering around the show fields to see everything from '60 muscle cars to Model Ts.



The show features 37 classes of vehicles including motorcycles/scooters, military, light and heavy commercial, Cadillacs, Packards, Corvettes, Mustangs, T-Birds, Chevys, Pontiacs, Studebakers, MG, and Foreign. Of course, there were Fords everywhere, Lincolns too. (continued on page 4)

Please stand by for an important announcement... (June meeting report)

Maury Cagle, our planned speaker for the June meeting about Old Time Radio, was unable to attend due to illness. The Regional Group Ford Faithful, however, will hear his program at the July meeting, Tuesday, July 8. As a result, the club did what many do when experiencing technical difficulties, **Show and Tell**.

Club Vice President Eric Sumner started the festivities by showing "The Thompson 'Know How' Manual for Wartime Automotive Trades" circa 1944. The manual covered all types of cars, Desoto, Buick, Chrysler, and Fords to help keep vehicles going through the war years.

Next up was Bill Parrish. He discussed the article Clff Green wrote in the June Valve Clatter about the book on Ford Dealerships. It turns out, one of our members, Clem Clement, knew about the dealerships mentioned in Cliff's article. In Clem's words "The Car dealership in Cliff Green's book review. Is ACE Motors of WoodburyNJ. ACE stands for Allan C. Eastlack. My father Roy Clement and Allen grew up together. Daddy bought 25 straight new

Fords from ACE. I have all theserial numbers and receipts. I bought 4 cars from Allan the son. I was by the dealership last year but Allen was out. I loved that dealership as a youngster. One long-time parts guy was so helpful to us kids."

"Merlin Dealership was in Camden on R38. There was a long line of dealerships there. Me and the boys haunted those dealerships in the 50's looking for bargains and women (We found neither). If I remember right they were next tothe Wynn's Friction Proofing Sign (Maybe factory as well). We would park inone and walk to several of them dreaming about the new cars."

It just so happens that Bill purchased a '55 Mercury from the Merlin dealership. He kept the dealer medallion attached to the car when he sold the Mercury. So, at the June meeting he presented Clem with the medallion.

Ken Burns followed, referring to Clem again in relation to Clem's article on Shackle Bolt removal in the June Valve Clatter. Ken showed us ont of the tools used in the process. Ken also passed out a photo of a Ford Display that included a radio in the background. Ford sponsored Radio programs and published the scripts. An example was passed around. John Girman's contribution was an explanation of a vintage car electrical tester. Clem Clement showed a blueprint for drilling the holes for attachment of spotlights on many different vintage cars, including his '39 Ford Pickup Truck. pulled many items out of a box that was a cornucopia of mysterious steel, wires, and grease, including: a vintage 6 volt battery charger, Hudson clutch plate, dash fans resuscitated by an overnight bath in automobile transmission oil, a snow funnel that keeps water out of the gas as a gas tank is filled - works on the difference in surface tension between water and gas -, and a dual carburetor for a Model A. Another member showed the group a set of Mercury 8 hub caps that were from an unknown Mercury model of the Flathead era. Al Edwards passed around a set of aftermarket lights "Errols Safety Device" with a '46 patent date, possibly used on Ford Trucks in the '48 to 52 period. Cliff Green concluded the festivities by mentioning that at the '34 Chicago Fair Ford required that all of its suppliers show examples of their product and manufacturing processes. One item handed around was a set of all the natural materials that went into the '34 Fords. The final item was a tray that was woodgrained to '34 standards and contained an inset of the Ford Rotunda. It was a great evening of stories and automotive memorabilia.



ANDWE HAVE LIFT OFF!

Dave Gunnarson sent out a request on our list server, requesting help to move his truck cab off the frame. More than enough volunteers showed up at his garage, one Sunday afternoon, to accomplish the task of raising the cab off the chassis eight feet up into the ceiling!!



How was this accomplished do you ask? Well, Dave has a very generous garage ceiling of about 20'. He has cleverly utilized this area as storage for all sort of things, including two complete truck beds for his 1 ton truck! Not withstanding, the joists above the ceiling have been braced to support such weight.



When the crew of Bill Selley, Dave Westrate, Eric Sumner, Clem Clement, Hank Dubois & Cliff Green arrived, the preparation work had been done. The gutted cab had a welded cradle under it with screw eyes on each corner. It was necessary to manually lift the cab off the brake and clutch pedals and ease it to the rear of the frame. Now, suspended from the ceiling were three come-alongs

attached to wires from the ceiling. The object was to raise the cab high enough to engage chains suspended from the supported ceiling. It worked as slick as a Worchester Poly Grad could have engineered it. With lots of encouraging chatter and cranking, the bed was soon suspended eight feet off the ground. As Dave said, Now we have a cab over!
