OUT AND ABOUT

Help With My Woody

That's right I have a woody! It's not a car but a wooden works shelf clock! I am a self-admitted 'wood butcher' when it comes to working with wood and a skill saw is my go-to tool. But at least I am smart enough to seek out expertise when it comes to something beyond my talents. That's where the EFV-8 Club comes to the rescue.

What I'm talking about is our club has so many folks who are multitalented and one of those is Dave Westrate. Over the years I have been in awe of Dave's ability and skill as a wood worker and followed the restoration of his 1939 Deluxe Woodie station wagon.

Well, I have a Silas Hoadley shelf clock that dates to circa 1820 and has been in the Randall family for most, if not all, that time. The old family Bible's first listing is Zebedee Randall, born April 5, 1771. It is quite possible this clock could have been first owned

by him and passed down.

Early American clockmakers turned to wood as their most plentiful raw material when they went into mass production in 1809. The plates of these clock movements were generally made from quarter sawed oak ¼ to 5/16 of an inch thick and the wheels (gears) were made of cherry. Brass mass production movements came into the market in the 1830s and this fact and the economic panic of 1837 signaled the demise of wooden movement clocks.



After many years of inactivity and storage, I tackled a restoration of the clock and now have it ticking away quite accurately. However, I needed to re-glue parts of the case and I knew my small metal clamps and Elmer's glue was probably not the best way to go. That's when I called upon Dave and he most graciously and patiently led me through the process of repairs. That's what's great about our club – helping each other out whatever the need. Many thanks, Dave.

Response to Keith from Dave Westrate:

Well, Keith, you are most welcome. I am honored that you would ask me to help you with a family heirloom that is so old and delicate. I have often said that a club is a beautiful thing and I teach woodworking at one called NOVA Labs in Reston, VA. They have a full wood shop there and it was the only place to tackle re-gluing the joints in the very old clock door.



NOVA Labs is a nonprofit "maker's space" for people who want to learn and make things. It is a part of a worldwide movement that supports a wide variety of projects, crafts, and technology. Keith and I took the clock door to NOVA labs and, after a few hours, the door was on its way home, glued and clamped to a flat support to dry for a few days.

The fun part of NOVA labs is experiencing the past and the future. Old dogs like me and Keith observed a few new tricks like computer-controlled wood and metal cutters, laser cutters, vacuum presses, and more. Much of what happens at the lab is related to technology such as young kids building robots and drones for competition. Yet, old school groups are doing blacksmithing, stained glass, embroidery, and more. I was surprised at how many young software engineers want to make wood projects because they cannot "touch or feel" the product of their daily work. They want something they can hold.

It dawned on us that the computer-controlled wood cutter could be used to cut wood gears for spare parts for very old clocks with wood gears like Keith's. Keith advises that these wood gears are the most difficult part to find to maintain and restore these valuable clocks. We are going to pursue this idea.

After we finished the glue-up, we talked about writing a Valve Clatter story, but we could not figure out how this was car-related, much less Ford-related. After some kibitzing, we reasoned that without time-measuring devices with wood gears, Henry Ford would not have been able to invent the assembly line, so it all "fits together."

Around and Around We Go *By David Westrate*


Our club member Eric Sumner has just been honored with a Fairfax County Outstanding Performance Award for 2018. He received this countywide award for his efforts in restoring a 1920's carousel at Fairfax County's Frying Pan Farm Park. This county facility is an operational depression-era farm complete with farm animals, farm equipment, barns, and a complete farmhouse of that period. The farm team plants, grows, and harvests crops such as corn and hay each season to help feed the animals. Eric's regular job is maintaining over 50 pieces of antique farm equipment

used on the farm.

Frying Pan has over one million visitors every year including lots and lots of children. The farm has a functioning 1920s Allan Herschell carousel, which is very popular.

Many years ago it was moved from the Lee District Park and it is believed that, at one point, parts from two carousels were put into the current machine to keep it going. The carousel is powered by an electric motor to drive the gear system. Over a year ago it was determined that many of the wood parts of the structure were deteriorated to the point that it was no longer safe. In particular, the "sweeps" or arms that extend from the top of the structure to support the outside perimeter were beyond repair.

The condition of the structure was way beyond normal maintenance and the projected cost of having the work done by a restoration specialist was prohibitive. Eric stepped in and over the course of the winter he coordinated county resources and reproduced the sweeps, rebuilt the carousel, and rehabilitated the gear system, which was a special challenge.

A restoration of this magnitude requires skill and confidence for which Eric has been appropriately recognized. He saved the county thousands of dollars and probably saved this carousel from extinction. Children and adults alike will enjoy the Allan Herschell for years to come. Nice job, Eric.

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
