A few days after I got home from my trip, a heavy box landed on my porch with the axle puller inside. I sent him a check for the shipping. At the end of the day, the shipping was probably as much or





more than a new puller, but that doesn't matter to me. I enjoyed accepting his offer and taking it off his hands.



### **SLOW BUT STEADY PROGRESS**

## **1938 Lincoln-Zephyr Convertible Coupe** *By Colin Spong*

It has been some time since I last wrote about the ongoing restoration of my 1938 Zephyr Convertible Coupe. It has been frustrating waiting for others to provide services. The upholstery shop that I have used in the past normally has a waiting time of 12 months and this was the case for me. Eventually, I took the car to them last summer for upholstery, carpets, and the convertible top.

Before going any further, a little lesson on 1938 LZ Convertible Coupes. The 1938 convertibles were the

first Zephyr convertibles. Within the 1938 production year, it is not generally known that there were three separate and distinctive convertible coupe body types. The first was known as the type 760 was a two-seater with a top mechanism different to anything used on any Ford product, as far as I am aware.

Hinged as they are, the roof side rails jackknife in toward the centre of the car and allow the windshield header bar to move almost straight back as if it were supposed to make a three-position top. The top then folds in the conventional manner.

This arrangement did not last for very long, as by January 1938, a second variation was available, known as the type 760A. The car body remained essentially the same, but with a top of more conventional design. In this design, the linking is arranged so that the header bar swings up and back in a big arc and the upper quarter lock pillars move back and down at the same time. Not content with this design, Lincoln then re-engineered the entire body to make it into a four-seater configuration. This produced a car with a much longer top and a shorter body behind the rear window, and was designated type 760B. Lincoln announced this at the beginning February 1938, this being the only convertible coupe now available.

Thanks to the late Dave Cole's research in "The Way of the Zephyr."

There are six known cars still in existence, but probably a few more that are not known to us. There are no type 760As known to survive. My car is type 760 number 3 of the 12 produced, two having been shipped to England while the remaining 10 went to Argentina. RHD Type 760B number 8 also exists in England, having been restored from an almost impossible heap of scrap.

When I bought my 760, it had been dismantled for restoration some 40 years previously. The owner

had literally dismantled everything – all mechanical components and even the door locks and speedometer. We found the components of the convertible top scattered around the storage barn and by good luck the only missing parts were the rear wooden bow, a few special shoulder bolts, and two toggles.



I made drawings of the bolts and a local engineering workshop made them in stainless steel. My friend, Jerry Richman in Massachusetts, had a pattern for the toggles and very kindly made a pair for me. The rear bow was a different problem. I drew up a template and had a woodworking shop make one from ash. This didn't fit, as it was too wide and the contour was incorrect. I then had the workshop reduce the width and increase the contour, but it was clearly not going to work. I contacted two other owners of 760s, Larry Butcher in Maryland and Roy Rowe in New Zealand. Both were very helpful with photographs and dimensions. Eventually Roy made a cardboard template, and from this I had an ash bow steam bent to the pattern, which worked perfectly. The person doing this quoted 3 weeks delivery and a given price. Four months later it was ready, but the final price was five times the original quoted price. Negotiations took place and a reasonable outcome was agreed upon.

There then followed several weeks of frustrating work trying to get the convertible top frame to align with the door windows when they were raised. I am sure that when Briggs assembled the bodies, they used shims to adjust the vertical channels that support the windows to get the alignment correct. I made a number of shims of different thicknesses in brass sheet and, by trial and error, eventually got the windows to the points where they fitted properly. I then spent a great deal more time in

getting the top to fit correctly to the header bow and then making the header bow fit to the brackets on the top of the body. The header bow had pieces of original upholstery board tacked to it to align the brackets, so this is what I used. I am glad that I was not paying somebody an hourly rate to do this work! The upholstery trimmer who made the top said that it was one of the most difficult he had ever done.



It must have been unsatisfactory from the very beginning, as Lincoln very quickly changed the design. If it doesn't leak around the joints it will be a miracle.

The upholstery was fairly straightforward – saddle tan leather hides for the seats and door panels.



A few fragments of the original carpets had come with the car, and from these we were able to ascertain the colour and the type. We agreed on a short tufted Wilton that was edged in leatherette that matched the seats.



The luggage areas, behind the seat and the trunk, used a lesser quality "cord" carpet, of which I still had a good quantity left from the restoration of the Zephyr Coupe 23 years before.

I now have a full set of original tools, including the correct jack found with one of the tool vendors at Hershey. I remember thinking that I paid more for the jack than my father paid for the 1937 Zephyr sedan 61 years ago.

What is remaining? Fit the engine splash pans, one of which is original and the other I had made to pattern. Remember that RHD splash pans are mirror image to LHDs.

There is also a complex splash pan that fits under the pedal assembly. It was missing from the convertible, but I had one on a sedan parts car that was partly rusted away with sections missing. Using the pan from the Zephyr Coupe as a pattern, I made the missing sections before welding it together. I have to say that it came out better than I expected. What I am still waiting for are the stainless steel mouldings that fit to the running board edges and the rear skirts, as these were missing. The fabricator has been "working" on these for some four years but I

still hold out hope. This should have been a fairly easy restoration, as the car had never been rusty or damaged and had only 15,000 miles on it. The problems were due to two factors: it was dismantled carelessly by someone else and stood in storage for 40 years and, as the third RHD car produced, it is almost a prototype with a great deal of hand finishing. For example, it has a RHD chassis and a LHD floor section with the RHD holes crudely cut by hand.

With any luck, I will be finished this summer... Must call that stainless steel fabricator this week.


### PLUGS FOR THE NEW AND NOT-SO-NEW

### **Ford Valves**



I am sure that many of us are familiar with the mushroom-ended valves and split-valve guides used in Ford-built engines. Back in the late 1950s, I can remember my father replacing the valves in the Lincoln V12 engine which are the same as the Ford V8. He bought new valves and guides and I helped him grind in the 24 valves and set the clearance on the tappets. Sitting in the garden during the summer school holidays, this seemed to take forever. I do remember him telling me to be careful not to mix the intake valves with the exhaust as they were different.

Last year I found on eBay a Ford Shop Manual published by Ford of Canada in February 1946 that dealt with wartime conventional and modified vehicles.



This has a number of useful details on the 1941 C11 ADF station wagon that I have started to restore. Have you ever wondered what those code markings on the heads of NOS Ford valves mean? This book has the answer and it would seem that there were at least seven different grades of valve according to the application. In some cases, they are intake or exhaust exclusively, whereas others can be used for either. These would most likely be the best to use for engines today with unleaded fuel. The diagram below clearly illustrates the valves, their marking and application.



# Annual Drive-In Movie Tour – September 21–22 Family Drive-In, Stephens City, VA




### Saturday, September 21:


