Make Someone Happy By Dave Westrate

The Northern Virginia Regional Group had its second opportunity on October 14 to visit an assisted living facility with our classic cars. This time we were invited to the Gardens at Fair Oaks in Fairfax, Virginia. Our Tour Director Hank Dubois and I visited the facility to plan our event and determined that about 10 cars would be a great fit for the parking area and allow for the residents to see us drive in and to inspect the parked cars on foot or in wheelchair.



Hank recruited Ford cars from the 1930s to the 1960s, which gave a timeline of vehicles of interest to the residents. The following participated:

- 2. Mike Petty 1931 Model A
- 3. Bill Simons 1934 Ford V-8 Deluxe Tudor
- 4. Hank Dubois 1935 Ford V-8 Deluxe 3-window Coupe
- 5. Dave Westrate 1939 Ford V-8 Standard Woodie Station Wagon
- Cliff Green 1940 Ford V-8 Deluxe Woodie Station Wagon
- 7. Leo Cummings 1950 Mercury Monterey Tudor
- 8. Frankie Martin 1951 Ford V-8 Custom Tudor
- 9. Jerry Atkins 1965 Ford Mustang

We met at a staging area where we lined up the cars by year and then drove to the facility. We did a drive-by of the residents who were assembled outside at the front entrance. We sounded our horns as we drove in and the residents were excited to see us and were taking a lot of pictures. For the next hour we were parked with sufficient space between us that residents in wheelchairs could be circulated among the cars and look in open doors. You could see that many of them had memories of the cars and we were all busy for the hour conversing with them.





One resident was Mr. Charles Schuck. He is 103 years young and was an aircraft mechanic in the United States Marine Corps. He became a small airplane pilot and then became an aircraft inspector in the Federal Aviation Administration where he issued license certificates for aircraft and pilots. He later became very active in the Experimental Aircraft Association where he spent 20 years helping develop


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their program for people who built and flew their own aircraft. For five years, when he was 95 to 100, he visited with elementary school students to talk about honoring the flag, airplanes, and birds. Mr. Schuck told an interesting story that, as a young man, he put a Model T Ford together. On his paper route he often saw a Model T engine in a yard that the owner said was going to be used for driving a sawmill. Eventually, Mr. Schuck talked the owner into giving him and his buddies the engine, which they put into their Model T project.

Colonel Gonzalo Fernandez also attended the show. He is 99 years young and a graduate of West Point. Back in the day, the Air Force was part of the Army. He became a pilot in the Air Force flying B-29 tankers and later became a navigator/bombardier on the new B-47 bomber. He recalled that the day he arrived for his assignment at Davis Monthan Air Force Base outside of Tucson, Arizona, the Air Force was just completing a nonstop around-the-world flight of an aircraft that was refueled several times and a huge achievement in the day. After he retired from the Air Force, Colonel Fernandez formed a private company that helped the Department of Defense manage its weapons systems.

We all enjoyed this hour with the residents and you could tell that even the folks who could not communicate well enjoyed seeing the cars. The staff repeatedly expressed their appreciation to the club for putting on this event which was the first of its kind for the residents, got them out into the fresh air, and helped them recall their life experiences. The Gardens staff treated us with a lovely lunch when it was all over. This event was an interesting way to use our cars to impact the lives of our senior citizens.

After navigating Rt. 55 to Front Royal, the caravan headed up Skyline Drive. At the Dickey Ridge Visitors Center we met up with Loretta and Bruce Metcalf. Temperatures were in the high 30s, so there were no worries about any flathead engine overheating! There's no heat in the '34s, so Loretta loaned Liz a warm banket to stave off the cold. Beautiful scenic vistas and fall leaves ruled the drive. Exiting on Rt. 211, the caravan then turned on Rt. 11 in New Market and drove into Staunton.

Patricia and Von Hardesty met the group for lunch in Staunton and Bill Tindall and Bettie McGarry and Joan and Dick Rial also arrived in their EFV-8s. After lunch at the Bistro in Staunton, we walked two blocks to the Bruce Elder Auto Museum. Located in a former Ford dealership building, and not actually a museum, it features antique cars for sale, display of the Elder collection and a few cars in storage.

Brian Rhodes, who runs the place and is manager of Antique and Classic Automobiles, LLC, provided a great tour of the building, including a history of the Ford dealership. (See the separate article in this edition of the *Valve Clatter* about the museum.)

The group headed back to our cars and proceeded toward Charlottesville on Rt. 250. When we reached Charlottesville, the brake pedal on the Skiles' car went to the floor but they were able to get it safely to the hotel parking lot. After checking into the hotel, we had dinner across busy Rt. 29 at Burton's Grille.

Day 2 started with Dave Skiles and Bill Simons crawling under the Cabriolet to see that the brake shaft equalizer was the problem. The Skiles stayed at the hotel to try to fix the car while the rest of the group drove to the University of Virginia for a tour of the original campus under beautiful blue skies and fall leaves.

A recent addition to the campus is the Enslaved Workers memorial. It traces the history and importance of slave labor in building and operating UVA from the start of construction through the end of the Civil War.

The final day featured a drive in the country from Charlottesville to Gordonsville to visit the Exchange Hotel.

The Exchange Hotel named as the place travelers could transfer between different rail lines which crossed in Gordonsville. The hotel was used as a Civil War recovery hospital and is now home to a museum of Gordonsville history.

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

The Bruce Elder Car Museum, Staunton, Virginia *By Dave Gunnarson*

Operating as an antique car dealership and car display and museum, Antique and Classic Automobiles, LLC opens by appointment. It's located in a building which was a Ford dealership for 54 years, from 1911 to 1965, and is reported to have been the largest Ford dealership in the south, processing 100 cars/month in 1919. As shown in the below photo, the Ford Dealership was known as the Beverly Garage in its early days.



The first floor was the showroom, second floor was offices, and overflow with the mechanics shop located on the third floor. Cars were moved between floors with a 1911 Otis elevator which we got to ride to the second floor.

The large size of the dealership may have been because Staunton invented a city manager type of government and early managers decided to pave roads, providing a nice way to drive a car; plus the town was very wealthy in the early 1900s, as a north-south and east-west railroad exchange provided lots of business opportunities.



Also known as Augusta Motor Sales, the large front windows provide a great view of Staunton looking out and of the great vehicles when looking inside.

On the second floor are cars and trucks originally collected by Bruce Elder or on display as related to the Ford dealership. For example, the 1924 Ford Model TT truck was purchased at Augusta Motor Sales, Inc. of Staunton, Virginia, for White Way Laundry Company of Staunton. This local company, now known as Staunton Steam Laundry was established in 1912 and is still owned and operated by the Beam family that bought this truck new. Like the company, this truck is still in their ownership.

The 1940 Standard 5-door coupe was purchased at this dealership in late 1939 and returned home after only one other owner.

An original 1928 Model AA 1 ½ ton truck with 42,817 miles was on display. It was purchased in the spring of 1928 for Eyklenburg & Abbott, a rigging company in Lynn, Massachusetts. Acquired from the son of one of the owners in 1973 and maintained in original condition since that time, it is on display on the second floor.

Among other displays is an original Ford Dealership sign which once hung outside the building.

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Mark Smith 3-Day Auction Lynchburg, VA 10/19-10/21

Though I never met Mark Smith, years ago, I bought Cadillac parts from him and met an employee of his who let me in one of his warehouses to pick up the parts. I was overwhelmed by what I saw. Smith was a major player in the classic car business dating back to the Harrah collection liquidation. He died last year and this recent auction was about the 6th event in liquidating his car and memorabilia collection. Folks at the sale told me the items offered over the 3-day sale represented his "junk." Already finding new homes were his Duesenberg, Locomobile, and assorted race cars. And still, the auction company offered 300 cars and 500 pallets – lots of automotive-related goodies.

Highlights below:

- 1936 Airstream Clipper Trailer totally gutted interior – no title or VIN: \$155,000
- 1932 Ford Model B Phaeton off road since 1967: \$48,000
- 1950 VW Split Window Beetle: \$49,000
- 1956 VW Split Window Beetle: \$17,500
- 1962 MGA Mark II Roadster: \$38,000
- 1934 Chrysler Airflow Major project: \$13,000
- 1935 Coca Cola Delivery Truck: \$30,000
- 1946 Ford Woodie partially restored: \$18,000
- 1946 Ford Woodie in storage since 1958: \$20,000

Note, not one of these vehicles was running and most had been sitting a minimum of 5 years – some 20 years. All needed some degree of work to be road worthy and, in some cases, full restoration. Prices did not include a 20% Buyers Premium. The auction company did a wonderful job marketing and conducting the sale. There were approximately 125 people on-site bidding each day and 1400 bidders registered online through 3 online platforms. Nice way to spend 3 days – window shopping of sorts. Arlington Cemetery has finally announced a scheduled date for Jim's funeral service and burial. The funeral will begin at 3:00 PM on Thursday, November 10, 2022. Guests are requested to <u>arrive 45</u> <u>minutes early</u> and meet at the Administrative Building at the cemetery.

After entering the main entrance to Arlington Cemetery, continue driving straight past where you would turn left for visitor parking. There will be guides available to tell you exactly the route to follow to the Administrative Building. There is parking for visitors at the Administrative Building. Folks will gather in a room in the Administrative Building until it's time to follow the hearse/caisson to the gravesite. You will be able to follow the procession in your personal vehicle to the gravesite. Once at the gravesite, you can park your car along side the road and walk the short distance to the burial site for the service.

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After the service, you can return to the Administrative Building parking lot (if you have car pooled to the gravesite). Or, you can depart directly from the gravesite. While at Arlington, a handout will be available with directions to a reception. The reception will be held at a friend's large home in Jim and Char's old neighborhood in Springfield.

For those who may not recall, Jim was a career Army pilot who served two tours in Viet Nam that included being shot down. This service is a most fitting tribute to a man who served his county with dignity and honor.

From Memorial Avenue, enter Arlington National Cemetery on Eisenhower Drive, turn left on King Drive, then take the first right into the special parking area for funeral parking. Cemetery guides will direct you to the Administrative Building.

You will be able to follow the procession in your personal vehicle to the gravesite. 


