The movie was very interesting, as it showed the competition between the Ford Motor Company and Ferrari. Lee lacocca convinced Henry Ford II to attempt to buy Ferrari, but Enzo Ferrari would have none of it and he teamed up with Fiat instead. The race was on for who could build the best race car for the 1966 24 hours of Le Mans in France.

Ford decided that the company was all in and teamed up with Carroll Shelby and driver/engineer Ken Miles. Miles had a bit of a hot temper and was not well liked by the Ford executive team. His son Peter played a big role in the movie as a developing young man interested in racing.

The team built the Ford GT 40 with much of the work being done near the Los Angeles airport. While brake problems were an issue, the car hit 218 MPH and Ferrari was concerned. A second GT 40 with a NASCAR pit crew won the 24 hours of Daytona when the team allowed the driver to push past 7000 RPMs in the last laps.

The Le Mans race was epic and Miles pulled ahead near the end. The Ford executives made him slow down as all three top finishers were Fords and they wanted them to cross the finish line together for publicity purposes. In a strange finish, Miles was ruled to have finished second as the number one car had "traveled more miles." Miles died two months later in an unrelated track crash. The movie closes with Carroll Shelby giving a wrench to Miles' son Peter. Miles had thrown the wrench at Shelby in a fit of anger early in the film. Fords won Le Mans in 1966, 1967, 1968, 1969. The award-winning film was released in 2019 and grossed \$225M at the box office.

Dave Skiles brought an assortment of candy, which Susan Skiles had selected, to complement David Gunnarson's popcorn, and a good time was had by all.

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RESTORATION UPDATES

The Right Tool – One of a Kind *By Dave Westrate*

We are getting close to completing the 1939 Deluxe Woodie project and time has come for some flathead horsepower to be fired up. The block that came with the car was no good, and we located a block from the estate of a well-known engine builder whose grandson told us that "the block was with the good engines."

Eric Sumner, club member, and our son-in-law found something unique several years ago in Falls Church, Virginia. It is a metal frame specifically designed to hold an operating Ford flathead 85 hp engine. Its history originates in California in an orange grove where it held an engine that powered the irrigation system for the orchard. it is thought to have traveled in the back of an old Dodge stake bed from the West Coast to the East Coast.

Eric's interest in this engine stand is to be able to work on engines without having them mounted in a vehicle. He has several engines that he plans to use it for. He did some welding repair before he set it up with a radiator, gauges, fuel source, etc. He also purchased two mufflers and engineered an exhaust system so the engine under repair runs quietly. The setup requires a transmission housing for proper mounting and stability.



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With any luck, we will be able to use the engine and get the Woodie back on the road after 20+ years of restoration. Stay tuned.

'39 Ford Brake Rebuild By Milford Sprecher

The last time I drove my '39 Ford was to the Rockville show a couple of years ago when the featured cars were years ending in 9. It was a good trip, but the brakes were spongy and I knew that a brake rebuild was due. The car is a mostly original Deluxe Fordor that has sadly not seen much road time since I have owned it. I had a guy from California get in touch with me about buying the car. He had seen car in the club calendar and tracked me down. He likes original '39s. I told him that I wasn't inclined to sell it, but that I would think about it and that the car needed a little work before I was ready to seriously discuss selling. This was the incentive I needed to focus on getting that car more roadworthy and driven more!

Last summer I pulled the rear drums, honed and rebuilt the wheel cylinders, and bought new shoes. The left rear wheel cylinder had been leaking and the drum needed turning, so Tom Terko did that for me. I disassembled the master cylinder and thought that a new one was in order, given the pitting I found and I installed it. My wife and I took a couple of trips in the fall and winter, so it wasn't until January that I got back in the garage to work on the car again.

I installed the rebuilt wheel cylinders and the brake shoes. I had some trouble getting the drums back on to discover through a post on Ford Barn and my own investigation that the parking brake mechanism wasn't releasing enough, so the brake shoes were partially engaged. Once I disconnected the cable, I was able to get the rear drums back on.

I then moved on to the front wheels. I had a leaking wheel cylinder in the front, too, but not as badly as the back. Upon disassembling the front wheel cylinders, I determined that they were too pitted to rebuild, so I bought two new ones from Dennis Carpenter. I looked at new brake shoes for the front, but they were expensive and apparently in short supply. I realized that the front and rear shoes were identical, so I took a pair of shoes from the front and one from the back that were not brakefluid soaked and installed them on the front, checking to make sure the shoes conformed to the brake drums. They were Canada-made Ford-branded shoes. I sanded the shoes and cleaned up the drums and installed them. I finished the job by adjusting the brakes following the procedure listed in a Wired Customs YouTube video and bled the brakes. Interestingly, the brake bleeders on the back used a 3/8 wrench, but the Chinese-made fronts needed a 10 mm wrench! I had torqued the rear axle nuts to 200# during reassembly.

I was happy to be able to start the car and do some back and forth testing in the garage and driveway before I took it out in the neighborhood for a little shakedown cruise.

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It performed well, although there was an audible rubbing coming from one of the wheels. When I got back to the garage, I jacked each wheel and spun them to see if I could see which one was rubbing. I didn't detect any issues, so I will take it on some more short runs to see what happens.




