The Carderock Division, Naval Surface Warfare Center, is situated on land near the Potomac River, about 15 miles from Washington, D.C., that was part of the farm owned by member Bill Potter's Grandfather. The site was purchased from the Potter family and construction of the DTMB began on September 8, 1937. The facility was dedicated on November 4, 1940, and named the David Taylor Model Basin in honor of Rear Admiral David Taylor. Research commenced at the new facility in 1941, several months after its dedication.

The DTMB was conceived, designed, and built by the US Navy for building and testing ship models for the purpose of making accurate and reliable predictions of the performance of ships and other vessels prior to construction.

The DTMB replaced a much smaller and outdated Experimental Model Basin (EMB) built in 1896 and located at the Washington Navy Yard. Naval Constructor David Taylor (later Rear Admiral David Taylor) designed and supervised construction of this facility and was in charge of its operation for 15 years. Taylor used wooden models for his tests at the EMB instead of inexpensive paraffin used by other naval engineers and, as a result, many of these early models have been preserved and are on display at the DTMB's museum.

The DTMB is many times larger than the facility it replaced and contains four basins capable of handling ship models of up to 40 ft. in length.

- A large deep-water basin, 1,886 ft. long by 51 ft. wide by 22 ft. deep, in which models of large ships can be towed or self-propelled.

- A special basin, 1168 ft. long by 21 ft. wide by 10 ft. deep, for running tests at high speed on models of motorboats, patrol boats and similar craft. - A shorter shallow-water basin, 303 ft. long by 51 ft. wide by 10 ft. deep, in which models of tugboats, barges, river craft, and other types of shallowwater vessels can be tested.

- A small model basin, 142 ft. long by 10 ft. wide by 5 ½ ft. deep, for testing special models or for unusual research problems.

Carriages, for towing models in the basins, run on rails on the basin walls. These rails are straighter and more level than the most perfect railroad track. To eliminate the effect of gravity on the motion of the towing carriages, the rails are not straight in the usual sense but follow the curvature of the earth. To ensure that the rails remain straight and level, the basin walls which support them are of massive concrete construction laid directly on bedrock.

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The capabilities at Carderock include the following:

There's a basin Maneuvering And Sea Keeping (MASK) basin which makes wave patterns to test ship models to determine the sea keeping properties of ships.

There is a subsonic wind testing area to understand air flow around upper structure of ships.

Additive manufacturing is being used for rapid prototyping of parts for ships and Carderock is testing how to deploy additive manufacturing at sea.

A deep submergence testing tank is used to simulate pressures at depth and predict how parts underwater will withstand the stresses.

A special non-magnetic building is used for testing scales models of ships and submarines to test how these vessels perform at interact with the earth's magnetic fields.

Carderock also measures the effects of shock tests of new classes of vessels. A 20-ton charge is detonated and the resultant shock is recorded.

Other presentation highlights:

As related by member Steve Blancard, an interesting thing occurred shortly after Hank started his presentation:

"Hank Zajic and I served together on the USS San Jacinto (CG 56) during Desert Shield/Desert Storm. During the war, we often stood watch together in the Combat Information Center. Back then, he was LCDR Zajic and I was Chief Blancard. At our February meeting, I did not recognize him initially. But, when his slide show started, several photos of our ship were displayed. I exclaimed 'That's my ship!' Hank responded that it was his ship too! After the meeting, we had a nice chat and talked about our time together over 32 years before. It turns out we both have Ford Model As, too!"

Bill Potter mentioned that his son works at Carderock in the Model Shop – another NVRG connection!

Winter Tour—Part I By Bill Potter

For the first NVRG tour of 2024, we were blessed with a nice February day and most of the usual suspects showed up (see photo) including 3 of our newer members: Prentice Dean, Mike Petty, and Gene Rainville.



Nova Labs was our destination, and their slogan says it all: "Rediscover the joy of making things". Imagine having a fabrication shop right in your backyard where you could go to create anything you could possibly imagine, all under one roof. And with a magic key you could admit yourself at any time, day or night, to fabricate your wildest construction fantasy. As a shop guy, I was intrigued by the concept: A pay-for-play wonderland that we toured with Dave Westrate acting as our tour guide.



For a modest monthly fee, members join this hobby shop on steroids which is open to all ages and all levels of expertise - they all help each other here. The vast warehouse was equipped with everything from bandsaws to cutting edge, state of the art CNC machine centers. Dave walked us through the various shops which included: 3D printers; robot design and assembly; machine shop; wood shop; welding shop with plasma cutter, and more.



The wood shop was the largest shop and apparently the most popular, as several retired guys were busy working on their pet projects. Dave commented that this was his favorite shop, which most of us fully understand after marveling at his freshly restored '39 Ford Woodie—a decades-long endeavor.

As a machinist kinda guy, I took a keen interest in the finger joint cutters that Dave and his buddies in the machine shop retro engineered exactly like the cutters used at Henry Ford's Iron Mountain

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I saw one gal working on a project but for the most part, this sandbox is where the boys come to play it's not pottery and primroses.





#### Winter Tour—Part II

The second part of our tour was conveniently located in the same building, down a short flight of stairs. Cas Shiver owns Sundog Productions, a custom T-shirt factory with the ability to print up to 14 different colors. Sundog is one of the largest Tshirt factories in the country and they print shirts for Disney, Harley-Davidson, and Smithsonian, just to name a few—a typical order is 7,000+ shirts.



Remember tie-dyed T-shirts? Well, they never really went away and seem to be making somewhat of a comeback these days. They are a house specialty, and the secret is in the intricate, time-consuming folding.



Cas also has computer-controlled embroidery machines for hats, jackets, or anything else and cranks out about 500 hats a day.

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He employs a small army of Latina Ladies that earn between \$12-\$17 an hour. These women work hard for their dinero—this ain't Uncle Sam.

Got a favorite photo of your car or grandkids? Cas will be happy to put it on a T-shirt for a nominal fee.

This was an interesting tour because everyone takes T-shirts for granted and none of us had a clue that this basement factory was even here. Plus, Cas turned out to be a great guy. Sundog Productions is the only manufacturing facility in Fairfax City!



From Barbara Westrate:

As you know, our tour this week took us through Sundog shirts in Fairfax. They have a new technology, which for the first time allows for taking a photograph and printing it on a shirt. The shirt in these pictures is the first one he's used. You can put as many as nine pictures on the front or back and you can choose the color of the shirts you want to use. He also said that we could put the club logo on the sleeve if we wanted to.



#### **1935 Pickup—Part III: Thermostats** By Nick Arrington

In getting this truck "over the curb", I noticed how much sludge was in the valve galley when working on stuck valves—but also how there was rust on the tin valve spring pickle forks which I figured was moisture related.

The truck was running no thermostats. I tried last month to put some generic thermostats that fit in the center mount water outlets on the heads, but they were ill fitting and must have cocked.

The temperature gauge registered barely 100 with them in place. I bought a pair 'modified' thermostats from Bob Shewman who advertises in the *V-8 Times*.

He also sells a fuel line from fuel pump to carb that does not leak down with a check valve. The modified units are taller than the generic ones. I thought I'd mount them up in the radiator neck.

However, a 37-style motor with the 35 radiator means I either use flex hoses or modify a set which were advertised to fit the mismatched radiator and heads. I was going to use a sleeve of the same inner size of the hose to keep the thermostat from walking around near the radiator inlet.

That didn't work, as too much length wouldn't fit in the end.

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The modified units fit nicely on top of the center mounted head outlets and the extended length allows a second hose clamp around the extended top of the thermostat which securely holds them in place. Fired up the truck and in 15 minutes it finally registered 160+ degrees. Hopefully some 'heat' will help some of the sticky rings free up, resulting in a bit more compression.




